DO YOU LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOR?

When Jesus was asked about the greatest commandment, he said that the first was to love God with all your heart, soul, and mind (Matt. 22:37-38). The second He said was to love your neighbor as yourself (Matt. 22:39). For the purpose of this article I want us to focus on the part about our neighbor. I want to define what it means to love our neighbor as well as define who falls into that category.

Let me begin with a story from my childhood. On January 1, 1968 around 10 p.m. our house caught fire and burned completely to the ground. We lost everything, even a car that was parked up close to the house. We escaped with our night close on. That was it. We went that night and stayed in the home of my grandmother. The next morning, people began to show up with stuff, everything from clothes, to furniture, and toys. I remember my parents being overwhelmed by the outpouring of love from our fellow Christian, community friends, and family. You see, this is the way people used to operate. If your neighbor was a farmer, and he got sick, you went over to help get in the crops. People showed their neighbors they cared by their actions. What type of impact do these actions have on our influence? Obviously, I have still not forgotten the love of the community I grew up in and in which I have chosen to raise my family because of that love.

Who is my neighbor? Do you suppose that when Jesus listed the two greatest commandments, He considered a neighbor to be the person living next-door? Jesus himself gave the answer to this in the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37). In this parable a Jewish lawyer found out that his neighbor could be anyone, including someone that he least expected.

Paul wrote that love does no harm to a neighbor, therefore love is the fulfillment of the law (Romans 13:10). And in a discourse in James 2, James wrote that one who fulfills the royal law, loves their neighbor as themselves (James 2:8). Just a few verses later James pointed out that lip service is of no benefit to our brother and sister who is in need (James 2:14-15). If they are in need, we have to show our care by our actions.

Paul said, "Therefore, as we have opportunity, let us do good to all, especially to those of the household of faith (Galatians 6:10)." We also know the Bible says that Jesus was a man that went about doing good (Acts 10:38). As people who wear the name Christian, we should be looking for the opportunity to do good for our fellow man and especially those of the household of faith.

Opportunities are all around us if we open our eyes. We have a extended sick list with 23 names, most of who would love a card, call, or visit. With a congregation our size we also have someone in the hospital almost on a weekly basis. I am sure that all of these people have needs. Finds someone who needs help, and show them you care. Showing love for our fellow man should be second only to showing our love for God. Let me close with these two questions. Do you love your neighbor? Do they know it?

"My brethren, let not many of you become teachers, knowing that we shall receive a stricter judgment. For we all stumble in many things. James 3:5 tells us our tongue may be little but it is powerful! How many times do we use our words for good and people are drawn to Christ? How many times have our words pushed someone closer to the world and away from the church? Let the words of our mouth be acceptable to God (Psalm 19:14).
